Over the last 30 years, I have worked with so many great women who have made huge contributions to Action Homeless, both people experiencing homelessness and staff. Many have been inspirational, many women and their children have been brave. I worked with and supported many brave women when I managed our Domestic Violence project where our work continues todau.

The most inspirational woman I ever knew was Maggie Bodell — Stagg. She worked as a support worker at Mayfield House which is where I first met her when I took over her job there, from then I was proud to say she was my friend. Maggie was a well-loved and much respected member of our community here in Leicester, serving for 17 years on the City Council and becoming Lord Mayor in 2002, raising £100,000 for her deserving charities.

She had the zest for life which is rarely seen. If you had met Maggie she would have left an impression that you will never forget. Kind, generous to a fault but with a strong and remarkable character that stood her as a great orator in her professional and personal life. Maggie had a heart of gold always thinking of others before herself, over the years being a member of several charitable organisations, helping those in need and giving her time freely and unselfishly.

Her 35 years working in homelessness and care organisations, culminated with the last 10 years at the Salvation Army, being the national funding officer for all the Salvation Army elderly care homes.

Very sadly, Maggie passed away in 2022. Maggie was indeed a very inspirational woman, a great inspiration to me and a great friend. I miss her deeply every day and would like to embrace her on International Women's Day 2023.

"When faced with being homeless, it was the most harrowing experience ever to be endured. I realise that I was given a roof over my head but suddenly you are a number in the system; you're suddenly in the wrong catchment area to see a doctor. But still I was grateful, because I was safe"
